"Text Me When You Get Home" —a phrase translated to every language spoken by women—symbolizes a shared hyper-vigilance born of necessity. TMWYGH weaves together the intricate layers of womanhood, resilience, and the inherent solidarity forged from collective survival and the pursuit of safety in community, highlighting the invisible threads that bind women across cultures.

Through *TMWYGH*, matriarchal narratives challenge systemic gender-based violence. Embodied textures and truths working together, presented art objects are reflective of not only a global, encumbering pain but of a collective action towards reclaiming power. Paintings drawing attention to the intersections of surveillance states and public expressions of queerness illustrate a reality, yet honors acts of flouting convention and taking space to be and feel the closest thing to free; beaded works encompassing personal iconography illuminates the critical nature of visual culture in relation to Indigenous futurity; ceramic works and textiles with impressions of weaving, written language, and illustrative work join to illustrate a scene of the ceremonial—pointing to particular energies invested in hoping and praying for the safety of others.

TMWYGH employs several forms of media in the process of centering storytelling and its vast, experimental capabilities, among them fine art, digital works, data visualization, and interactive installations developed with a deep hope for true engagement, visceral, emotional responses, and utter acknowledgement of challenges faced and solidarity built on a global scale.
