It is a geographical, historical, and intellectual exploration that combines the high with the low, art with non-art, and the mundane with the extraordinary.

Wednesday

10:00am-12:30pm

Volunteer at the 39th Annual Three Kings Day Parade

104th Street at Central Park East
New York (Upper East Side), NY
Admission: none



For more than three decades, El Museo del Barrio has celebrated and promoted the Three Kings Day tradition with an annual parade. This year's parade begins at 106th Street and Lexington Avenue and travels to Third Avenue to end at 115th Street and Park Avenue. The procession features camels, colorful puppets, floats, and thousands of students and community members as participants.

We have signed you up to volunteer at this parade. Volunteers accompany school groups along the route, distribute crowns to parade participants during the parade, and engage with children, families, and the parade audience throughout the parade route. Look for the volunteer area, and introduce yourself--they're expecting you!

1:15pm

Use a CitiBike to ride around Central Park

84th Street and Park Ave - Pick up a CitiBike
Central Park East
New York (Upper East Side), NY
Admission: Bring your CitiBike key



From the CitiBike station, either bike or walk with the bike directly West on 84th Street until you reach Central Park. The map we've provided shows the dark green paths on which you can ride your bike. The largest loop is 6.1 miles/9.8 km and is a great way to get a sense of the park, one of New York City's treasures.

You may return your bike to any CitiBike dock, though there is one conveniently located at the Southeast corner of the park, at 59th Street/Central Park South (outside of the Park).

3:30pm

Circle Line Cruises: Landmarks Tour

Pier 83

Admission: Your ticket is printed for you.



See Manhattan from the water. The 2 Hour Semi-Circle Tour lets you experience the grandeur of mid and lower Manhattan. You'll enjoy magnificent views of the world's premier skyline and a close-up view of Lady Liberty. Sail down the Hudson, cruise around the Battery, up the East River, and under the Brooklyn, Manhattan and Williamsburg Bridges to the United Nations and back. You'll be able to see the architectural growth of the city and understand how the city was built up from the southern-most tip all that way through to the skyscrapers of Midtown. It's a bit touristy, but it's a great way to get oriented to the city. Please note that **boarding begins 30 minutes prior to the listed sailing time** of your cruise.

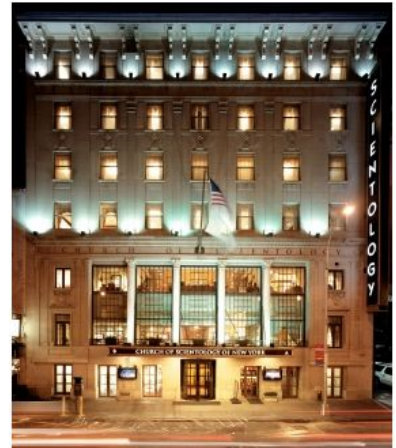
Self-guided Tour at The Church of Scientology

227 West 46th Street (between 7th and 8th Aves)

New York (Times Square), NY 10036

Admission: none

Scientology is a rather controversial practice in the United States, with critics likening it more to a (very powerful, very wealthy) cult than a religion. Nonetheless, its centers remain open to the public. Go check it out, but don't share your personal information with them! This center also offers a "Free Dianetics Film" which runs throughout the day on no particular schedule. Check the listing in Room 1000 to see what cases are appearing today, and select the one that seems most interesting. When you get to room 1000, the list should be hanging on the wall, but if you have trouble finding it, just ask a clerk. Please note: **you will need proper identification (passport) to enter the building.**



3:00pm

Radical Alphabet City Tour

Museum of Reclaimed Urban Space

155 Avenue C (b/w 9th and 10th Streets)

New York (Alphabet City), NY

Tour Admission: \$20.00 (Keep receipt--we will reimburse you!)

Come visit legendary historic sites where this community faced off with gentrification and corporate power. Peek inside vibrant community gardens and legendary tenement buildings, Tompkins Square Park, the first community-based recycling center and the symbol of gentrification, The Christodora House.



MoRUS is a volunteer-run small history museum of grassroots activism. They tell the story of efforts to create community spaces on the Lower East Side, especially efforts that “reclaim” space that has been taken over by city bureaucracies or corporations. They highlight the political implications of how social structures shape and control our space. The museum presents a long-term historical perspective on how the urban landscape evolves through cycles.

Dark Nights, Bright Lights: Winter Solar System Workshop

Compost/Garden Volunteer

Added Value's Red Hook Community Farm

Admission: none

Come dressed for the weather and ready to get dirty. Assist with the largest community compost site in the United States that runs entirely on renewable resources (sun, wind, and human power).

This NYC Compost Project hosted by the Brooklyn Botanic

Garden operates the compost site at the Red Hook Community Farm (across from IKEA). The program diverts tons of organic material each month from landfills and uses it to create beautiful soil amendments that will help grow much-needed healthful food for the community. Volunteers will engage in a variety of tasks related to the compost program, which may include building new mounds with donated food and wood chips, turning mounds, or sifting.



1:00pm

Raaka Chocolate Factory Tour with Scott Andrews

64 Seabring Street (between Richards & Van Brunt Streets)

Admission: We have printed your confirmation.

Discover unroasted chocolate made in Brooklyn. At this factory in Red Hook, you'll get to taste raw cacao from different regions and compare how flavors vary across the world. From there, see what transforms raw cacao to the silky smooth texture of these bars. End the tour by savoring all of their signature craft bars, now knowing what makes their flavors so bold.



By day, Scott works along the famously-polluted Newtown Creek (the creek that divides Brooklyn from Queens) to test its waters for various toxins as part of a government-funded cleanup effort. On the side, he is an incredible and inventive chef and connoisseur of good food, and holds elaborate dinner parties by the season featuring his own tried and true recipes. Ask him about his work on the creek and about his latest dinner, and let him know about some of the things you've been doing so far on your Fellowship!

Museum of Morbid Anatomy

The Morbid Anatomy Museum is a new 4,200 square foot non-profit institution dedicated to the celebration and exhibition of artifacts, histories, and ideas which fall between the cracks of high and low culture, death and beauty, and disciplinary divides. It often focuses on material histories of the macabre. Don't miss their Morbid Anatomy Library, a research library and collection making available thousands of books, photographs, artworks, pieces of ephemera, and artifacts relating to medical museums, anatomical art, collectors and collecting, cabinets of curiosity, the history of medicine, death and society, natural history, arcane media, and curiosity and curiosities, broadly considered.

Film: *Pflicht* • (dir: Alfred Hitchcock)

The Metrograph (theater)

A romance built on manipulations, double-crossings and suspense, and the ultimate entangling of Hitchcock's favorite genre forms. Grant is government agent T.R. Devlin, who hires Alicia Huberman to infiltrate a ring of Nazis by seducing their leader. The only problem is that Devlin has already fallen in love with Alicia by the time he thrusts her into the arms of an enemy. The film signals a high-water mark in Hitchcock's visual style, as masterfully choreographed camera movements reveal personal motivations and moral ambiguities among the characters.

Morris-Jumel Mansion

65 Jumel Terrace (between West 162nd and West 160th Streets)

New York (Washington Heights), NY

Admission: \$10, keep receipt

General George Washington used Morris-Jumel Mansion as his headquarters during the fall of 1776. It was during this period that the General's troops forced a British retreat at the Revolutionary War Battle of Harlem Heights. The house was built eleven years before the revolution, in 1765, by British Colonel Roger Morris and his American wife, Mary Philipse. The breezy hilltop location proved an ideal location for the family's summer home. Known as Mount Morris, this northern Manhattan estate stretched from the Harlem to the Hudson Rivers and covered more than 130 acres. Because they were loyal to the crown, the Morrises were eventually forced to return to England.

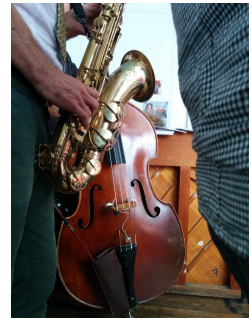
Parlor Jazz at Marjorie Eliot's

555 Edgecombe Avenue (between West 159th and West 160th Streets)

New York (Harlem/Washington Heights), NY

Admission: none, but bring \$2 to donate and we'll reimburse you.

Every Sunday for more than a decade, rain or shine, with no vacations, a jazz concert has taken place in the parlor of Marjorie Eliot's home on what she calls the northern tip of Harlem. Her weekly free concerts in the living room of her apartment are legendary in Harlem and an institution for jazz lovers citywide. There are no clear signs and no one really answers the bell, but just follow your nose and you'll find the place.
