Skate Create Liberate: Women Artists and the Future of Radical Space in Ethiopia explores the radical possibilities of movement, sisterhood, and artistic resistance through the lens of Ethiopian women artists and the Ethiopian Girl Skaters collective.

Each week at Addis Skate Park, a group of girls gathers to skate, teach, and build community. Their presence is both playful and political; a reclaiming of space, voice, and visibility in a society that often sidelines young women. In a culture shaped by surveillance and silence, these girls make noise. Their movement is not only kinetic; it is symbolic, liberatory, and visionary.

The exhibition uses the energy of these skaters as a powerful metaphor. What does it mean to claim ground, to move freely, to fall and rise again together? How can such radical space-making extend beyond the skate park into the inner and outer lives of Ethiopian women artists?

Through photography, painting, collage, and audio installation, the exhibition traverses motion and stillness, visibility and intimacy. It explores resistance as healing, presence as protest, and creativity as a form of survival. *Skate Create Liberate* becomes a site of gathering; between art and action, between girlhood and womanhood, between memory and movement. It celebrates those who skate, create, and liberate.
